A breathtaking white-water rafting excursion on the rapids of the Indus River rounded off a 15-day leadership training workshop for the school's core academic staff in August 2017.

The workshop was given by visiting trainer Kris Krause from the United States, who stressed the need for a "professional learning community" who shared the school's mission, vision and values.

Topics covered included developing a school improvement plan, improving skills for school leaders to strengthen student achievement, and planning lessons that produce high levels of student motivation and engagement.

Teachers, staff, support staff and the Student Council all took part in the white water rafting excursion.

In a message to the workshop participants afterwards, Kris praised their enthusiasm and eagerness to learn. "You are ready to support other teachers in their own development as master teachers," he wrote. "So many children will benefit from your work!"



Professional learning community initiative

The professional development of the teaching staff remains an important focus and various organisations have shared their expertise. Training has included:

Feb 2017. Teachers visited Sanskriti School in New Delhi, now affiliated as a sister school.

March 2017. James Biddulph, head teacher of the University of Cambridge Primary School in the UK, visited the school to foster ties between the two schools and discuss strategy and professional development.

Sept 2017. Mind Mingle - an initiative hosted at the school and supported by the Indian government to provide opportunities for school leaders across the country and abroad to share best practices.

Dec 2017. The principal, teachers and parents attended a workshop and training sessions at Parvarish in Gurgaon, India, a research centre for special needs children.

Jan-Feb 2018. Professional development training for teachers at the Podar World School, Gujarat, India, and at the Nirmal Bhartia School, New Delhi, as well as maths refresher sessions at Jodo Gyan, New Delhi.

March 2018. The school invited government and private schools to take part in training in Jolly Phonics, a child-centred approach to teaching literacy through synthetic phonics.

Construction news 2017-2023


In October 2017, we completed the refurbishment of the first residential building in the mudslide repair and seismic upgrade programme. The design will be rolled out to the other seven residences at a rate of two per year.

Design work with our Arup team of architects and engineers has been a major focus in the past 18 months. The local construction manager, Sonam Angdus, made his first visit to Europe early in 2017 to participate in a series of design workshops. Arup engineer Kevin Kilcoyne spent six months at the school working with Sonam Angdus and his team on the refurbishment of the oldest residence, named Khardongla.

In London, the Arup team were working on the designs for the refurbishment of six junior school classrooms, the only two-storey building on the site, which, as such, presents a challenge. Thanks to the hard work of those involved, the work has started and is due to finish by the end of the season. To have facilities out of action inevitably causes problems for a functioning school of 840 students, and everyone has shown great dedication and resilience in difficult circumstances. It is envisaged that the refurbishment will take until 2023, so we need to keep providing funds to ensure the buildings remain useable and safe.

Health and wellbeing - eco shower buildings


Improving the health and wellbeing of the children is important.

The eco shower building completed in 2017 is a prototype design for Ladakh. It is sustainably designed: the inside temperature is maintained and the water is heated by the sun, and the grey water is used to irrigate the gardens nearby. The building is seismically resilient to comply with the Indian code.

There will be four eco shower buildings, one in each residential courtyard. The eight old washrooms will be converted into additional dormitory space for 64 children.

Dragon garden landscape programme

The apple and apricot fruit orchard was extended again last year, with the third arc around the classroom mandala planted in early spring, and the drip irrigation system was extended. Two volunteer landscape architects, from the United States and the UK, will be spending several weeks at the school developing a plant strategy for the campus.

Khardongla, Zojila, Taklangla, Singeyla, Warila, Penzila, Changla and Namkila.
