

Latest quake shows urgency of school's seismic upgrade work

A 4.6 magnitude earthquake shook Ladakh in January this year, just 13 months after the region was jolted by a previous, stronger tremor. Neither caused damage or casualties but they highlighted the urgency of seismic upgrade work at the school. The epicentre of the latest quake was just 48 miles (78km) away.

The Geological Survey of India classifies Ladakh, in the Himalayan mountain range, as a high seismic risk zone. The Himalayas formed as a result of the collision between the Indian oceanic plate and Eurasian continental plate, which began 50 million years ago and still triggers earthquakes today. According to international seismic data reviewed by Arup engineers, the seismic risk in the region has increased 10-fold from 2001 when the school opened. The preservation of life is paramount and our programme to upgrade school buildings is intended to ensure the buildings are resilient enough to prevent danger to life.

A quarter of the residential buildings have been upgraded and two more will be completed this year. Refurbishment of the two-storey junior school will be completed this year. Alongside this seismic upgrade work the second new eco-shower building is being constructed.

Students take part in conference in Mumbai

Student delegates and the principal flew to Mumbai in August to take part in the four-day national student conference, the Indian International Model United Nations. The 13 students, aged 14 to 16, gave a display of traditional Ladakhi singing and dancing as part of the opening ceremony. The students took part in various committees, which engaged in analytical debate and discussion, and proposed solutions to global disputes, including peace-keeping, disarmament and settling international issues. The experience boosts the confidence and self-assurance of all those who take part.

Drive against plastic pollution: World Environment day June 5th 2018

It was the aim of the school's founder, and of the Arup architects and engineers, that DPKS should be an eco-friendly model school for the world. With this in mind, in 2015, students and staff joined the campaign against environmental pollution by declaring its campus a plastic- and junk-free zone. Three years on, senior students in conjunction with the Waterkeeper Alliance project in the Himalayas, joined a drive to rid the village of Shey of rubbish. They spent the day clearing litter from paths, waterways and roadsides. They agreed one day was not enough.

Celebrating the 17th anniversary of the school's opening, the houses Courage, Unity, Harmony and Wisdom staged performances on the theme of "Transition in the culture, attire, habits, lifestyle and attitude of Leh-Ladakh in the last 15 years", including communication, from ancient methods to the mobile phone, and the effects of tourism on Ladakh. Tutored by the Terence Lewis Contemporary Dance Company, 120 students gave a highly ambitious dance performance. Among the guests was the Chief Executive Councillor of the Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council, Dorjey Motup, who applauded the students' performance and praised the union of native culture and modernity through education.

Dragon garden landscape programme

Jennifer Chandler, a volunteer landscape architect from the United States, spent seven weeks at the school working on a planting strategy in keeping with the ecological principles of minimising water use. She worked with the gardeners Tsetan and Rigzin on pruning trees, including preparing pruning diagrams, and showed them how to gather seeds and propagate plants from cuttings. She stressed the importance of labelling, checking and watering cuttings so they will be ready for planting out after the winter. Jennifer also worked on irrigation, grey water management and design issues, including trees for the mandala. Indigenous species of roses, geraniums, irises and grasses were among drought-tolerant plants gathered from surrounding areas. Jennifer is returning this year.
